1993 AGM

Strictly speaking these factors made the meeting unconstitutional and hence void. Should we do it again or do you all accept the outcome? The shortcomings would not have come to light but for the "alarm bells" set ringing in our minds following the departure of so many members during the meeting. We will need to control our meetings to a slightly more formal level in the future.

The 1994 regs (Valid from January 1st 1994) are available now from Steve Kirby - just ask. Please bear in mind the Roll-bar rules and the updated scrutineering article in the 1994 ARC Yearbook are also valid. Remember too, that the regulations in the RAC Yearbook apply to us too. Such a lot to read!

The contents of the HBRO Trials Handbook has now been incorporated, albeit in a modified form, into the ARC Yearbook. The dedicated HBRO version is still available and can be distributed to members at club meetings. So if there is an argument about crossing tracks, looping or taking a shunt, then the solution is now in writing.

We have worked out that it's cheaper to send forms directly to those who need them most, so it is for them that we offer this service.

The Alternative "Camel Trophy"

Due to the fact that HM forces managed to ruin my off-road career (no laughs please), the Alternative "Camel Trophy" was born in downtown Croatia. The teams consisted of a well knackered (technical term for worn out) Diesel 110 FFR (Fitted For Radio), a truly thrashed (starship mileage) 110 V8 from the MT (Motor Transport) pool and any other suitable transport available. The plan was to drive from the port of Split to Tuzla in three days; then Tuzla back to the port in one day.

DAY TWO

Stage 3 - GV to Vitez. A simple stage just like driving across the plain except the dust was horrific; it got everywhere and I mean everywhere. Vitez was quiet when we got to the outskirts so it was simple run into the camp which looks like a huge container park.

Stage 4. (SS3) Vitez to Tuzla. A gentle run up to the start of SS3 which was a back-breaking bone-shaker of a stage; it is a surprise how the relief convoys manage to get through. Throughout this SS, checkpoints of different armies have to be negotiated. Talk about complicated. This SS ends about 50 miles short of Tuzla, by this time the back had gone completely.

SS4. This was a trip to the front line, BiH side following a food convoy. A simple task except the Serb belligerence of paperwork.

SS5 - Another part of the front line where you had to drive as fast as you can to avoid the mortar fire controller. Once upon the front line, we walked up to the BiH trenches to observe the Serb gun positions which were about 150 yards away. One of the BiH only had 6 rounds in his magazine!! The return trip had an added complication when a donkey walked right in front of us. We finished the stage, then on to Hotel Tuzla, a 5 Star hotel, what a relief to have a shower and a decent bed.

DAY THREE

Woke up bright and early ready for the mad dash back to Split via Vitez, GV and TSG, a drive of over 250 miles and we were going to do it in record time. The term "head-down / arse-up" had a whole new meaning. Through 42 check-points and fired upon numerous times we finally made it back to Split, a rapturous welcome and a sack full of beer. Oh! Well maybe no rapturous welcome but what a night on the beer!


RTV & CCV Trial, Wapsey's Wood, December 5th Invite from Anglian Rover Owner's Club.

The Major's Trial


RTV and CCVT Trial at Slab Common December 19th


