

This will be round three of the Winter Trial Series. Entries should be on an official entry form if possible. The fee is £10 in advance or £12 on the day. Payment to Gary. (Address inside front cover.) Scrutineering will be at 9:00.a.m. and the competition will start at 10:00.a.m. prompt, so please be on time. ARC rules will apply as usual. RTV will be a qualifying round for the "Red Leader Shield" and the "Pilot Trophy".

Burst Pipes

The second Winter Trial at Brick Kiln Farm was a great event thanks to all those who made it possible.

Having driven around all day in low ratios, the first move in high gears always feels a bit odd. By the time I got to the bottom of the hill and onto the main road, it was evident that something was wrong. The change from second to third was decidedly lumpy and as I sauntered along at 25, stuck in third, it became clear that the link twixt clutch and pedal was no longer there. I pulled at the gear lever and it slipped into fourth with no problem without touching the pedal. Alton was only a short drive away with a couple of roundabouts to negotiate - could I get round them in fourth? The first one was full of traffic and my attempts to change down resulted in crashed gears so I coasted to a halt, killing the engine just as it stalled. Neutral and a restart revealed that there was no way to get into first. Recalling past occasions recovering mum's clutchless Simca 1000 and Fiat Uno (leaking hydraulics and broken cable respectively) I restarted with the box in first - no problem. Lifting foot off throttle and pulling on gear lever at the same time produced smooth changes (Well, no crashing anyway) and I was soon on my way again. Changing up seemed to be no problem as just described because the gearbox is expecting lower engine speed and the synchros will disengage and re-engage when the speed is about right. Changing down is a different matter. Here you can pull the gear into neutral by gently "pumping" the throttle until it disengages. You then have to rev the engine gently because it's now expecting more revs, not less. I never did get this bit guite right all the way home, often having to come to a complete halt and restart. A brief stop to examine the damage revealed an empty master cylinder and a split flex hose to the slave cylinder. Not much chance of effecting a repair on a freezing Sunday evening. All the way to Aldershot was easy - should I call into Mike and Tracey and fling myself on their mercy? Better not, they've got enough trouble with their own car being hors de combat. (That means out of commission, not war-horse! although in their case....) Farnborough was not so easy, there were several stops on the way through. At last I was on the M3 with an easy run home. 40 miles with no clutch - not the way to end a fun day out but it could have been a long cold walk to a phone followed by a long wait for the RAC!

Rickshaw Ramble, Weaver's Down, 8th-9th January.

This event is run by the Army for members of the forces including the Police, Coastguards and members of the Civil Servants Motoring Association. The event consists of several driving and navigational exercises over the weekend of 8/9th January.

The tests include orienteering, Safari night navigation and an off-road driving course which is where our club comes in. We have again been asked to set out and marshal the observed sections around the course. For this, we get to use one of the tests, this year it will be the "safari" on Broxhead Common, in the dark! This is not a speed event, you have to transfer pace notes on to a map and then find information boards around the course. All you need is a standard vehicle, torch, compass and a navigator to swear at!


We should be finished marshalling by 4 pm so I thought we'd have a burger in the camp and then go up to Broxhead about 5pm and do the safari to save coming back on Sunday. If last year's scatter is anything to go by, it should be good fun.

As last year, we will meet for a briefing at the Longmoor Camp main gate at 8pm on Saturday 8th January. The route will be arrowed this year, so hopefully we won't get lost. All observed sections will be on Weaver's Down. I am going round on the Friday and marking the starts and finishes of the six observed sections, all we have to do is to put the canes in before 10 am.

The competitors are timed so the sections have to be set so they won't get stuck as they have to make it to the finish of each section, picking up an accumulative 5 points for each stop or cane hit. We will have to time any stoppages or hold-ups so it can be deducted from their final times.

Anyone who wants to help, contact me (0730-267146) as soon as possible as I have to get passes sorted out. Entry must be via the **main gate** as everyone on the site must have a vehicle pass and personal pass. We may **not** be using the "track to site" shown on the map opposite. Don't worry if you've never marshalled before; full training will be given. If you can't make it all day, still ring me as I may be able to sort out late passes.

Winter Trials Series 2. BRICK KILN FARM. 28th November.

This site has interesting topography (1st big word) namely several hills and slippery slopes with quite a large wooded area containing two bomb craters.

Scrutineering finished, we started the first section.

1st section. The start was at the bottom of a hill with some light turns back and forth over a hump across the side of a hill. After a few vehicles had been through, one turn became impassable due to erosion around some tree roots. Though some gave it different approaches with plenty of welly, few got past that point. I was lucky being second away.

2nd section. This went downhill into a recently cleared copse with a few tricky side slopes and tree stumps ("Ouch, was was that, Dad?" says Gavin Duffett) before turning back uphill crossing a rutted puddle and quite a step-up to the one gate.

3rd section. After gate eight, it was quite a laid-back affair (which actually was how it was set out, sorry Nick) | stalled it between gates four and one. The RACMSA have issued a warning that this is in contravention of rule E.6.2. and they will take action against anyone reported driving on the public road with competition numbers still affixed. Many HBRO vehicles still carry competition numbers. Please remove them or cover them up. Thanks.

Numbers are agenda items. 1, 2 & 3 were the opening of the meeting, apologies for absence and review of last meeting's minutes.

- 4) Matters arising from last meeting
- The stolen flag is to be replaced and Harold Carman will make a flag-pole at cost price. The storm damaged ARC banner is to be repaired.

5) Chairman:-

- Pete Oakden talked about the special meeting for non-competitive clubs that took place on the 9th October. This was held because it was perceived that the ARC was failing to serve members of non-competitive clubs. It was well supported, useful and constructive. Certain initiatives have been started. P+Ds 1994 National Rally will have facilities for non-competitive issues and it is proposed that the ARC should host an "All Rover Weekend" with Concours d'Elegance, gymkhana etc. This will be held on the 15th to 17th July 1994 at Gaydon (the vehicle test centre), Warwickshire. It's just off junction 12 on the M40. Land Rover Ltd will support this event and there will be a BBQ on Saturday night. Note that this is the War of the Roses weekend. More details nearer the time. 1995 may see a long on-road event of some kind.
- ARC Yearbook the 1995 edition will be updated and expanded to contain information on general issues, social events, club details etc. Please contribute. HBRO members can send stuff via me if you like.
- LR Ltd is showing an interest in the ARC again. They intend to get involved actively in the 94 Rally but blank cheques are still a long way off!!
- ARC to appoint a medical officer.
- Request for club 2 badges from each club for a display board.
 Adrian will deal with this for HBRO.

6) Secretary.

Andy Stavordale announced that he was still very busy. He has received much mail - the advertising / marketing stuff is now being forwarded to Graham Chick (ARC Shop). He continues to receive club newsletters and lots of correspondence.

Range Rover Register feel they are not being taken seriously. ARTAAB and the same to you. This is the Association of Road Traffic Act Authorising Bodies - a group set up so that such bodies (the ARC is one) can present a common voice to the Department of Transport. The professional Drivers Association is a member but refuses to divulge any details of its activities, fees etc. Definitely an organisation to avoid.

What does the CCMSA do? For those of you who have been on holiday on the Moon or who may be new members, the CCMSA is the Cross Country Motor Sports Agency, a wholly owned subsidiary of the ARC. It can issue exemptions to non-ARC clubs or to non-competitive ARC clubs on an occasional basis. Andrew Neaves can supply a DoT pamphlet with details.

7) Treasurer

Lawrence Johnson went into much detail about incomings and outgoings but basically stated that we have £530 in the current account and £9000 in the deposit account. If that sounds a lot, its less than £1 per member savings and will soon diminish if a big bill comes in.

8) National Rally 1994

1994 - P+D (Peak and Dukeries) are running this and it's at Shottle, between Asbourne and Belper.

1995 Lincs have Blankney Park, 8m south of Lincoln.

9) CCMSA

This is for use by non-ARC clubs and on an occasional basis by ARC clubs that are not RACMSA affiliated. It is administered by Andrew Neaves. Contact him for more details.

10) ARC vehicle log-books

Details of the way these will be administered have yet to be finalised. Suffice it to say that they will be introduced during 1994

but will not be compulsory until 1995.

11) Proposed vehicle regulation changes.

These were all listed in October's P&B. No HBRO members commented on any of them so I assume you all approve! Yes? No? Do let me know, it's not too late!

12) LARA Subscriptions.

As mentioned in October's P&B, the ARC withheld part of the subscription. LARA have requested payment of the remainder. This was agreed on condition that LARA provide more info on what they get up to.

13) ARC Financing

In order to be self-sufficient, the ARC must raise more money from the members. To this end, there will be a levy of £1 for every full member, as of Jan 94. Lucky we just put our fees up!

14) Scrutineering Committee - Terms of reference. Each club needs an individual to issue the previously mentioned log-books. To be discussed.

15) Section Reports.

- A) Caravan Secretary Jim Campbell was not present.
- B) Overseas Liaison Officer. Brief report read by Andy. Nowt that affects HBRO though. I had a phone call from a man in Germany who wants to join a UK club. I sent him a membership form and an ARC Yearbook.
- C) Rights of Way There will be a conference next year on "white roads". Contact Mary Stevens on 0704-894136. LARA now have an Information Officer to supply publicity leaflets. This is Tim Stevens on the above number. There were many complaints about the difficulty in getting in contact with Alan Kind of LARA.
- D) National Rally Liaison Rally matters are already covered.
- E) ARC Newsletter Can clubs send diaries of events and other articles for publication in the ARC newsletter.
- F) Press, Publicity & Sponsorship Wendy Roberts was not present.
- G) Rover Company Liaison Charles Whitaker will try to get

- copies of LR World for the next meeting.
- H) Technical Officer Ken Knight was not present, but he has been asked by LR Ltd to parry enquiries about vehicles now out of production.
- I) Club Shop Co-ordinator. Grahan Chick announced that a 55 minute video containing Land Rover adverts and film from the past. It is called "Anything You Can Do" and costs about £15.
- J) Car Club Liaison. The agenda for the day was modified to enable a parallel meeting of non-competitive clubs. They suggested routine and non-competitive matters to be dealt with in the morning with separate meetings in the afternoon.
- K) RACMSA Liaison. Harold Carman raised several points:
 - i) Clerk of the Course registration not required yet.
 - ii) Medical Cover the committee has not met yet.
 - iii) Medical organisations should include more than the presently listed Red Cross, St. John & St. Andrews.
 - iv) The ARC could become its own medical organisation.
 - v) Where is the ARC going? A policy statement will be issued by the council in due course.
 - vi) Ian Davis of the RACMSA wants to come to an EGM. OK.
 - vii) The documentation sent by ARC clubs to the RACMSA is of a poor standard. Please take a little more time over it folks!
- L) Shows and Displays. June and Jack Green asked Charles Whitaker for more LR posters.
- M) Scrutineers Dave Marsh's items have been dealt with under 10 and 11.
- N) CCMSA Co-ordinator. Andrew Neaves stated that we have had only a few applications but it's expected to build up slowly. He keeps files on his activities.

So that's about it. After a 298 mile round trip, I felt that Tracey and I had put in a good day's work on behalf of the ARC and HBRO......

Scrutineering Matters

Are you entering another club's event? Have a good look at their SRs (Supplementary Regulations) if any. We recommend that you all carry a suitable spare wheel and tyre and paint your tow-points in a contrasting colour in accordance with RACMSA rules in case the scrutineers request it. HBRO's SRs (published last month) do not require tow-points to be painted nor for CCVTs to need a spare wheel. Also check that your wheels are covered by mudguards, flares etc. and that your engine bulkhead has no holes in it. Note too that engine air intakes / filters are not permitted inside the cab.

SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS (SRs)

The following SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS will apply to all HBRO events unless otherwise advertised in this magazine.

- Seat belts (If fitted) must be worn at all events. Fitment is compulsory from Jan. 1st 1994)
- 2) Spare wheels & tyres need not be carried by CCVT vehicles. (Ref: RACMSA reg. H.22.7.2.)
- 3) Towing points need not be painted in a contrasting colour. (Ref: RACMSA reg. H.22.13.3.)
- Babcross, Canonica, Maxi-cross or similar open block tread tyres may not be used.
- 5) Only RTV trials vehicles need to be registered and taxed. (Ref: RACMSA reg. H.22.13.1.)
- 6) Only RTV trials vehicles must comply with all Statutory Regulations as to Construction and Use and lighting.
 (Ref: RACMSA reg. H.22.13.2.)
- Vehicle may be of a commercial type.

(Ref: RACMSA reg. E.13.19.6.)

8) Some trials sections may be timed.

(Ref: RACMSA reg H.12.3.14.)

NOTES

Some RACMSA requirements (that are waived above) may be required at other club's events. Enquire before entering.

Please note the following matters that can cause vehicles to fail scrutineering:-

- a) Wheels / tyres protruding from the bodywork must be covered by "mudguards" of some description.. See RACMSA reg. E.13.2.7.
- b) All vehicles must be fitted with securely mounted seats for the driver and a passenger. See RACMSA reg. H.22.3.1.
- c) Contrary to popular belief, a tow-rope is not mandatory. We do however recommend you have one and it should preferably be made of NYLON. See RACMSA reg. H.22.13.6.
