



ARC AGM 1994

Only Adrian Bolge and Steve Kirby attended from HBRO this year. Surely some more of you are interested in the workings of the National body!

Anyway, here is a summary of events made from notes taken at the meeting. Any accusations of bias should be addressed to the editor.

Matters Arising (from previous minutes):-

Harold Carman will provide a flag-pole for the new flag (the previous one having been stolen whilst on loan to the RAC) Harold is also looking into a grand Comp Safari Series to be run in rounds in different parts of the country. Tony Kempster (vice chairman) is looking into the possibility of running some Road Rallies (for all types of vehicles)

Chairman's Report. Peter Oakden.

We have had a successful and progressive year with the council working well as a team. New events have been promoted and relations with Land Rover Limited have been improved.

On the matter of BMW, where is the ARC going now and what should its official opinion / view be? Basically the ARC has no objection to the take-over.

1994 National rally run by Peak & Dukeries - there is substantial support for the event.

The 1995 Hand-book is progressing well with Land Rover now paying half the £10,000 cost.

The All-Rover Weekend at Gaydon on the 16th and 17th July is also progressing well. There will be Water supplies and Elsan disposal but visitors will need to bring their own toilets. Entries to Andy Stavordale (ARC Secretary). Caravan rate is £5. Parking for pre-booked ARC visitors will be on the same site as the caravanning. 600 passes (300 / day) are to be distributed to clubs. There will be a Best Vehicle event on each of the two days. There will also be an Auto-Jumble but will not be allowed to degenerate into a junk sale. There should also be an on-foot treasure hunt.

lan Davis of the RACMSA is to be invited to the National Rally and also to the June ARC meeting to answer questions from members.

The ARC should bring our two patrons, Tom Barton and Major B. Hervey-Bathurst closer to the organisation. At the moment, they are merely names on our headed paper.

Despite the change of policy by the RACMSA, the ARC does not accept financial sponsorship for competition vehicles.

The ARC needs a long-term plan in the form of a policy statement as to where the ARC will be in the next 5 or 10 years.

6) Secretary's Report. Andy Stavordale.

Advertising material received was laid out for delegates to peruse.

Some 1994 Hand-books are still available.

On show was the Tom Boydell Memorial Trophy.

The ARC is an Authorising Body and attended a meeting of the Association of Authorising Bodies. ARC has been invited to join at a cost of £50 p.a. The AAB will be administered by the ACU (Auto-Cycle Union) and will provide a central forum to external bodies such as Police forces.

Some car clubs and the Series Three Club want to come to the National rally even though they are no longer members of the ARC. They were asked if they wanted to re-join - the P6 club stated they would rejoin but the Series Three Club wasn't so sure. Andy stated that despite some mis- and dis-information, the Series Three Club can be re-instated and are welcome to return to the "fold". (They left somewhat under a cloud a while back).

Dave Barker's article in LRO has caused a stir but the matter should now be considered closed.

The NRA (National Rivers Authority) have complained to an ARC club about pollution resulting from vehicles driving through a stream. The complaint wasn't about oil, pollution in this case was defined as "Suspended solids" i.e. silt stirred up by the vehicles and drifting downstream and upsetting fishermen. Strange set of standards here where a blood-sport takes priority!

Fire-proof overalls - despite statement in adverts from certain manufacturers, fire-proof overalls are not required for cross-country events. (Yet)

7) Treasurer's Report. Lawrence Johnson.

Main point is that outgoings exceed income!

Expenses - Lawrence felt that council members' telephone bills and travelling expenses should not be paid by the ARC. He cited £1700 claimed by just two council members. The view from the floor was that the council members shouldn't have to "sponsor" the ARC in this way. I think Lawrence really raised the point to highlight the running costs of an organisation of the size of the ARC and if the 10,000 or so members want about 20 others to drive around, make phone calls, write letters etc. etc. on their behalf, then they will have to pay for it. The ARC is rapidly developing into a large, highly regarded, professional organisation and all this has to be paid for. A quick vote of those present clearly indicated that the members are indeed willing to pay for this activity.

A large amount of material, equipment and promotional items was donated by Land Rover Ltd about five years ago to the ARC Club Shop (Which no longer exists). This realised about £6000 which was put in the separate "Club Shop Account" in case LR wanted it back. Lawrence asked if this could be released into the main account. A vote on-the-spot said "yes" so the ARC 1995 accounts will get a welcome injection.

8) ARC Vehicle Log Books and Scrutineering Committee Restructuring.

This has been described before and following a brief discussion, the scrutineering Committee will go ahead and establish the system and its attendant documentation in readiness for final voting in June. If the ARC's Log-

book is rejected, then we will have the RACMSA one thrust upon us instead. There is no escape.

9) Vehicle Regulations

The list has been published before. All were accepted except for non-Rover engines in Range Rovers and locking diffs. The latter just failed by 12 votes to 10. If I keep trying, perhaps the rest of the ARC will see sense next time. (There's bias for you!!)

10) Rally 1994 and 1995

Rally 1994 - RTV, CCVT, Comp Safari entries now closed. Notts LRC are running a rough terrain off-road course. This is NOT a scenic drive in the usual sense in that it will not be suitable for Range Rovers with spoilers etc. Southern ROC are running a follow-on rally.

Rally 1995 - Lincs. LRC are running this at Blankney Park, 8 miles south of Lincoln.

11) Election of Officers.

Dennis Bourne is now Vice Chairman and Peter Oakden is to take on Rover Group Liaison following Charles Whitaker's retirement from the position. Steve Barnwell has left the Scrutineering Committee and we have Martin Dransfield of the Yorkshire club in his place.

12)

A) Caravan Officer. Jim Campbell reminded us that the Landowner's permission (there is a form for this) is needed as well as the application form. Events lasting up to 5 nights do not need planning permission as the ARC has DoE (Department of Environment) exemption. The fee is only £2. Contravention of this could easily lose the ARC its DoE exemption - so don't abuse the privilege.

If you tow with your vehicle, make sure you have an "E" category on it - you can't tow without one!

Warning on 4-wheel caravans with ALKO chassis - Check for suitability if towing with a Land Rover; you may need a stiffened A-frame on the caravan as these can crack if you use the vehicle to position the van on rough ground.

B) Overseas Liaison Officer. Fran Luxton.

Asked for a "Certificate of membership" for overseas member clubs.

C) Rights of Way and Land Use. Tony Kempster.

Discussion mainly on the finances of LARA. A £2700 grant has been given to LARA from the Sports Council.

Increases in fees from the likes of the ARC are to be restricted to the rate of inflation.

To increase membership of LARA, Associate Membership is to be introduced to enable individuals to be involved in LARA.

Post-cards are available to enable prompt reporting of obstructions to relevant councils.

The Ridgeway. The code of Conduct / restraint seems to be working, still. Byways & Bridleways Trust. The ARC subscription to the "Law Review" is £145. This includes the 10 journals and the £65 extra for the extra copy for the Yorkshire club. Suggestion that the ARC should be an ordinary member at about £25 p.a. and pay LARA the £65 to get an extra copy from them. This would save some money whilst still providing the information to Tony.

D) National Rally Liaison. Information already covered in item 10.

E) ARC Newsletter. Ted Ivory.

Although Ted didn't like the name "Runes", it seems that the membership do so the ARC Newsletter will be called "Rover Runes" again.

- F) Press, Publicity and Sponsorship. Wendy Roberts. Nothing of note to report.
- G) Rover Club Liaison. Charles Whitaker. He is resigning his post due to other work commitments but will endeavour to provide Land Rover World newsletters to the meetings.
- H) Technical Officer. Ken Knight. Not present
- I) Club Shop. Graham Chick.
 The "Anything you can do" video is now available. (I bought one)

J) Car Clubs Liaison. Tony Holder.
The-is basically covers the non-competitive clubs. They are to ask the Rover
Group how to further the aims of the Rover Group and the non-competitive
side of the ARC

K) RACMSA Liaison. Harold Carman. Clerks of the Course. These are not needed for cross-country events. The RACMSA are to introduce them for Auto-tests in 1995 and are considering if and when to extend it further.

First-Aid. The ARC view is that any qualified first-aider should be acceptable. If a member is a first-aider in the factory where they work (for example) then that should be good enough for the ARC.

Log-books. The RACMSA recognises and accepts the ARC log-book. The

AWDC and other organisations also need one but if they don't produce one themselves that is acceptable to the RACMSA, then they will have to use the RACMSA one. A big problem is the lack of standardisation and compatibility of rules between all organisations. The ARC is unusual in being a "One Marque" club and its rules will always be different.

Noise. Harold asked for information from member clubs on noise. Is there any to be had?

Hill Rally. This is to be run to National "A" rules and it appears that the driver and navigator need to have a National "A" licence too. They will need to have completed four Comp Safaris to qualify. An existing licence can be upgraded. This is a change from previous information which stated that a "B" licence would suffice. If you intend to compete, contact the organisers ASAP to check. Roll-bars. The RACMSA is showing an interest in ARC roll-bar regs. The ARC is the only organisation in the country with a published set of regulations for roll-bars dedicated to Cross Country vehicles.

The Hill Rally scrutineer wants the ARC and the AWDC to agree on a common set of regs. When you've stopped laughing you can read on.

L) Shows & Displays. June & Jack Green.

It seems that the grass-roots level members bring their complaints to June and Jack! This is probably because it is only them that are visible at major events. Material is still wanted from clubs - badges, newsletters, anything that can be given to interested members of the public to promote the ARC and its activities.

The BFGoodrich show - no news at this meeting but details should be available by the time you read this.

M) Scrutineering. Dave Marsh.

Not much to add following previous discussions on rule changes and the log-book.

N) CCMSA co-ordinator, Cross Country Motor Sports Agency. Andrew Neaves. Andrew has processed six applications this year. Well, it's a start!

AOB

Overseas members are to have a new organisation for members of overseas clubs to participate in UK events.

Defender hand-books clearly state that these vehicles should run on radial tyres only. What is the ARC doing about this? The Scrutineering Committee will discuss the matter.

TALE FROM A NEWCOMER

I've only been a member of the club since September 1993 and as yet have not been to any meets, but first a little history.

I own two Land Rovers, a 1976 SIII LWB safari which I obtained in 1987, and a 1963 SIIa SWB which I got in 1992. The LWB was purchased with the excuse that I needed it for the Boy's club I ran at the time. This vehicle is currently undergoing restoration and has been for the past three years, but I'm getting there. The SWB was found by my wife (who doesn't like Land Rovers because of the amount of time I spend on them). A colleague where she worked mentioned that her husband had an old Land Rover in a barn. My wife thought I could use it for parts for the LWB. I paid £150 for it, the 5 new Firestone SATs alone were worth the money, and a few hundred pounds and many hours later managed to get it through an MOT.

When I moved to Aldershot four years ago I didn't think it worth joining the club at the time because I hadn't got a serviceable Land Rover to join in events with. In the event I missed out on all the expertise and skills that can be gained from the club, such as Neville Dewdney who recently did some welding for me.

Although I've owned a Land Rover for seven years now, until recently my only experience of Off Roading was driving into field for the boy's camps. A friend at work, Dave, who owns a SIII SWB safari, and I decided to start off on the right track and go on a proper Off Road training course. So on April 7th we arrived at David Bowyer's Off Road School in Devon for a 1½ day course. As Dave's vehicle was newer and had 7.50 tyres on it he agreed to use his Land-Rover for the course. To cut cost we decided to camp, a bad decision. We travelled down on the Wednesday in good weather. When shown the field we were to camp in we thought it must be part of the course. It had a 40 degree slope to it and was very boggy. The field was in the grounds of the village pub which the school uses for lunches. All was calm when we pitched our tent but in the night it blew a gale and Dave had to admit that his girl friend was right in that it wasn't altogether waterproof.

On arriving at the school was found there was only one other Land Rover on the course. There was however three people doing the Frontera course, but they don't use their own precious vehicles. The other Land Rover was a coil sprung SIII built by Warwick 4 x 4. An interesting vehicle but a bit expensive at £9000. Dave had mentioned that it some times jumped out of 1st gear, not uncommon as I'm sure you know. However, come the first descent of the course, it wouldn't go 5 yards without jumping out. You couldn't even hold it in. The instructor didn't like it at all and for a minute I thought we wouldn't be allowed to carry on with the course. However, we were able to continue using 2nd gear, along with the gentle use of cadence braking. As it was we only missed out on a couple of obstacles where first gear was an

absolute must.

We arrived back at the camp site that day to find the strong winds had broken the tent. As it happened the wind had done us a favour. It transpired that the pub had a few flats that it rented out. One was empty under going a few repairs. The owners very kindly let us use this flat, at no extra cost. That night we slept soundly without fear of being blown away or getting soaked. It also meant we were able to pack all our gear properly in the dry.

The next ½ day's training covered winching. After the usual classroom talk on the whys and wherefores and do's and don'ts it was out in the rain for some hands-on. We looked at the various uses of the high lift jack, then pulled one of the Land Rovers with a Tirfor (actually a Brano version that David sells) before going back onto the course to do a Kinetic Energy Recovery. This did not give the jolt that I was expecting but then I wasn't properly stuck. After a final play on the course it was back to the yard to pressure wash the vehicles before departing.

All in all a very worthwhile and enjoyable course. I still find it hard to believe that I actually drove over / through some of the obstacles on the course and eagerly await the return of my photos to prove it. I'm looking forward to joining some of you green laning and helping set out on some of the events. As for actually taking part in the trials, well we'll have to wait and see.

THÉNISSEY 1993 - PART THREE

Comparison of ours and Pierre's road books confirmed that after different beginnings all books followed the same route. At my errors we were gradually overtaken by twos and threes. Pierre decided his tribe were out for the count and made for camp. My navigators' heavy eyelids led to our losing our way, so we had to give up. My local map came to the resue and we made it back about one forty-five. Others were still returning as I at last reached the land of nod.

You can't go landrovering on the continent without meeting someone from last time. I had been to an Italian randonee back in November '91 so into whom did I run but Amedeo Valentino with wife and daughter. He introduced me to the rest of "The First Landrover Club Italia" but my italian deserted me at the crucial moment. Another previous aquaintance, from the same trip, turned out to be Phillip de Villefranche, whose metaphoric baby this French National is. He has two other young children and his relatives own the Château.

From early morning it began to drip. Traction was swiftly lost on the tracks around the camp. The ground didn't cut up, the mud just squeezed through to the surface. Fitting the new UJ was an ideal passtime for the morning. Pierre lent me a pair of circlip pliers, it was at least dry underneath the 110. The afternoon inherited the morning's skidpan tracks, just the job for the trial! There were only a dozen competitors, whose task was to overcome the terrain rather than avoid canes. The single section commenced with an almost suicidally fierce one in one exposed downhill right-hander. Within a yard the offside front wheel dropped a further foot with the SATs grating on radius arms as the drivers crept gingerly down, half an inch at a time. No "low first and feet off", you used brakes, both feet on the ground and a ground anchor to safeguard your progress! Definitely an "Anglian" trial.

The predominance of British Land Rovers are on the "straight" side. The French seem less fettered by the "original spec" school. This was refreshingly evident in the wealth of imaginative and free—thinking colour schemes and modifications to be found on every side. Amongst the former were an eye—catching reptilian mottle in white on blue, the amoebiform 'mottles' being about 18 inches across, and a go—faster stipe modelled on the pyrenees. Words cannot do them justice. You must come to Thénnisey and see them for yourself. A real "breath of fresh air". Generally there were more lwb deisel hardtops with side windows than I recall from home 'Nationals'.

A ninety near my tent had an unusually neat bonnet-mount for its spare wheel. The roll cage was carefully arranged to disfigure the bodywork as little as possible by using existing bolt locations for nearly all the mounts. It's neatness impressed me, as did the rear door interior mounted toolbox. The owner, in contrast to his engineering ingenuity and flair. was as impressive for his abominable diction. I can manage to follow many broad dialects within the British Isles. Here, even with the object of discussion under our very noses, this fellow's was beyond the pale. The situation was compounded by his hopelessly poor recall of the details of the job. It sounded as if the speech chip in his brain contained a computer virus as the output of sounds. syllables. words and then sentences oradually merged as he spoke.

With the UJ replaced I tried to obtain a 'Day' Roadbook from reception. "Too wet still." was the response to my request. I settled for what might be called a "Villages" or "Sightseeing" Roadbook. The southwesterly sun showed off, to advantage, an oceanic expanse of soft fluffy cloud as I breasted the rim of the plateau. The billows were supported by pairs of pylons which dominated the scene like gaint chess kings and queens striding to the horizon, as I set off on the start of what, in total, would have been a forty-mile itinerary.

An "Agricultural Machinery Museum" caught my eye. It was a large collection, far from fully ordered. I spent the best part of half an hour fathoming out a kind of lathe that made clogs! Clogs are hardly the most symmetrical of creations, so how could they be made on a lathe, which just goes round? At last light dawned as I searched for a cam to produce the eccentric shape. The machine did not work from scratch. It used an already made clog as the master/cam for the next. It didn't manage the whole job but certainly made light work of the main lines, hand finishing being the order of the day at the turn of the century.

I returned to camp to meet my tent-neighbours on the other side. Alexis, Colette, Romain, 6, and Benoir, 5, come from the Somme area. Alexis bemoaned the high cost of 4×4 accessories in France. He estimated that my Brownchurch could set him back about 600 pounds. I countered that they were only a third of that brand new, mine was second hand and I would find him one when I returned home. A card to Gary mentioned this and he had already found one in MROC mag as soon as I set foot on blighty. It started its journey looking very small in a Beauvais International tautliner. (Colette's employer's carrier). Alexis couldn't afford to come over and pick it up but wanted it for their Summer holiday. arrived, Colette was teased by being told that 16 roof racks had arrived. ("4 x 4 roofrack")! I collected the Ffr600 when I called on them between the German and French Velocette rallies in September.

The astmosphere at Thénnisey is very friendly and relaxed, due not least to the absence of a competition treadmill. There is no 'trade' activity. The site does not cater for people - 1500 - on a regular basis. The number of loos and wash basins adjacent to the Château can be counted on two hands. Bring your own. (Hands, of course) What I will call a 'canteen' runs for breakfast and evening meals if you fancy the local fare/plonk and don't want to cook.

Scrutineering Matters

Are you entering another club's event? Have a good look at their SRs (Supplementary Regulations) if any. We recommend that you all carry a suitable spare wheel and tyre and paint your tow-points in a contrasting colour in accordance with RACMSA rules in case the scrutineers request it. HBRO's SRs (published last month) do not require tow-points to be painted nor for CCVTs to need a spare wheel. Also check that your wheels are covered by mudguards, flares etc. and that your engine bulkhead has no holes in it. Note too that engine air intakes / filters are not permitted inside the cab.
