
Events for Your Diary



Scrutineering will be at 9:00. a.m. and the competition will start at 10:00. a.m. prompt, so please be on time. ARC rules will apply as usual. You should now all have a 1997 ARC Handbook. Contact the secretary if you haven't got one yet. Don't forget your MOT certificates and driving licences.

RTV will be a qualifying round for the "Red Leader Shield" (for standard leaf-sprung vehicles) and the "Pilot Trophy" (for Range Rovers).

Please come along on Saturday to help lay out. On the Sunday, please enrol as a marshal once in a while, we'll show you how to score if you've not done it before!

TYRO TRIALS

Last month's ARC Report mentioned Tyro Trials. So what are they? These were introduced at the start of 1997 but details were finalised too late to be included in the 1997 Blue Book. The following detailed regulations were copied verbatim from the Spring 97 edition of RACMSA News:-

Vehicle eligibility.

All Standard Production 4x4 vehicles with Petrol or Diesel engines, mass produced by a motor manufacturer and generally available for normal; retail sale or was available via a network of dealers, whether designed principally for the transportation of passengers, commercial use or dual purpose. Saloon cars and car derived commercial vehicles are prohibited.

All vehicles must display a current VED disc (trade plates are not acceptable) and where appropriate the vehicle must possess a valid MoT certificate.

Front seats may be replaced but rear seats, and the original number of seats with which the vehicle was manufactured must be retained. Bumpers must be retained in their original position. Safety improvements may be added to the vehicle.

Driver and Passenger Eligibility.

Drivers must hold a valid full RTA licence (not provisional) in respect of vehicles having more than three wheels (see E.2.6.) The SRs may permit entries to be accepted in respect of drivers who are 16 or 17 or over without a full RTA licence, provided that the passenger holds a full RTA licence and is a person who has experience of Off Road Trials. The vehicle may only be driven between observed sections by a crew member who hold a full RTA licence.

All drivers must produce a valid club membership card. More than one passenger may be carried where the driver hold a full RTA licence. Passengers under the age of 16 will not be deemed competitors for the purposes of licences or club membership and will not be required to sign-on. They will however be required to produces a letter of consent from a parent or guardian at 'signing-on' and this letter will be retained by the organisers.

All passengers shall be properly seated, the seat back shall be upright and the seat adequately fixed. All occupants must wear an approved seat belt at all times.

Only passengers seated in forward facing seats will be allowed, the seat back shall be upright and passenger(s) shall face forwards. The passenger sitting alongside the driver must be at least 14 years of age.

Passengers who occupy the rear seats of the vehicle must not be less than 2 years of age, any child under 4 years of age must be seated in an approved 'child seat'.

Organisation.

Events must comply with the following;

- 1) The terrain chosen should be such that vehicles should not catch the bodywork on approach, ramp breakover, or departure angles, and consideration should be given to the vehicles entered when laying out sections.
 - 2) The maximum longitudinal gradient shall be 50%.
 - 3) The maximum transverse gradient shall be 25%.
 - 4) The maximum depth of any water shall be 0.3 metre.
- 5) Vehicles must be capable of traversing sections without contacting any trees, bushes or other natural features.
- 6) No features may be included within sections which are likely to cause damage to the underside of competing vehicles.

END

There seems to be much repetition and tautology in the text but I'm told this is deliberate in order to highlight the gentle nature of the event. Note that the above describes the manner in which a trial is to be run for the benefit of tyros (beginners) and does not mention the status of the participating vehicles. Don't forget that a 50% (1-in-2) climb / descent and a 25% (1-in-4) side-slope may seem rather tame to an experienced trialler, but is probably quite exciting for the first-time off-road driver who finds the Peak District daunting.

If you want to run an event to these rules, please contact Ashley and volunteer. We tried running "tame" RTVs some time ago for first-time drivers and / or new vehicles but there wasn't a specific set of regulations to act as quidelines. Now that there is, perhaps we should try again.

THE TRUE VOICE OF THE HBRO?

As a long time member of the Hants & Berks Rover Owners as well as Rally Secretary of this year's ARC International Rally, I read Sue & Nick van den Braak's article with interest. They are of course quite right that these matters must be discussed, but I would like to counter, and perhaps correct, some of the points they raise. (If I talk about "us" as the NWLRC and "you" as HBRO, this is only for convenience, if Hants & Berks do put on the International, I'll be there helping.)

It is some years since I was able to attend an HBRO AGM, although I have been asked to come to this year's to talk about the international Rally and, work permitting, fully intend to, so I do not know what "very poor" attendance means. I am sure I have read somewhere that if you get more than 10% of members attending an AGM you are doing well (this applied to organisations in general, not just Rover Clubs). In fact we have recently been getting a quarter attending so we can't be doing too much wrong.

The question of the Club not being big enough is an old one that doesn't hold up under examination, according to the figures I have, based on what clubs declare when paying their ARC subs, HBRO are the second biggest club not to have staged a National Rally in the past ten years (Scottish are bigger but obviously have geographic difficulties) some are considerably smaller. As for the number of active members from conversations I have had with other clubs. I don't think yours are untypical. I accept that we got our sums wrong and most of the problems we had can be traced back to a lack of manpower, but if all clubs could guarantee they had all the manpower they need before bidding for an event, I doubt there would ever be an International Rally. You are in a different situation as although membership levels are similar, the area isn't. How many HB members, living within the Club area, regularly have to travel over 60 miles to attend a club trial also held within the Club area? You should not be afraid to look beyond the Club looking for help, we have L&C on our eastern boundary and S&S off the SE corner, and that's it. You appear to be almost surrounded by ARC clubs, as well as having at least two thriving non-ARC clubs in the area. if approached correctly many of their members may be more than happy to assist and have the necessary knowledge of other events, there is nothing in the rules that states Marshals' vehicles must be ARC-legal!

Our Subcommittee consisted of around 17 members but of those the bulk of the work was done by about half a dozen, admittedly they have had a busy year. It is only over the event that larger numbers are needed.

As for finding a site, whilst this is important I doubt that half the (Inter)Nationals held over the last ten years have been on the site intended when the bid was put in, I suspect the figure is far lower. As it is necessary to put the bid in about three years in advance it will often be impossible to tie down land owners (especially Welsh sheep farmers) that far ahead.

Sue & Nick have suggested some questions to put to members, perhaps

I could comment on these.

- Self explanatory.
- 2) Although these tasks need spreading around, I am no fan of large committees.

Most of these jobs, provided you only take on jobs you are capable of, are not too arduous, although the ability to take the odd day off work will help, but it is only a small handful who will find their lives taken over, and I suspect those are the ones advocating the event anyway.

- 3) Although a lot of work was put in during the months preceding, only two of us moved on site on the Monday (although a couple more were there but going home at night). This figure built up, with many coming after work (some having finished early) for the evening, but it was Wednesday when I moved in. The work force had split in two, some, mainly self-employed, had been able to take odd days off during the week in the months beforehand (some almost one a week) but were reluctant to leave their businesses for a fortnight, others, mainly in employment, found taking days off inconvenient, but were able to take their holiday over the Rally.
- 4) Amazingly the site was largely cleaned up by Tuesday evening, from then it only required a couple to stay until the last of the contractors had removed the toilets, marquees, etc.
- 5) This is the biggy, the question of members participating was the most controversial decision we made, and only after a lot of very heated discussion. Other matters that need deciding early, although possibly by the Committee rather that all the members, is whether members should pay for camping (this will depend largely on the agreement with the land owner, if he is requiring payment per caravan per night over the entire period, this could get expensive), and how expenses are to be paid. If anyone enters into organising this event and expects to be reimbursed every last penny they are in for a rude awakening (and I would question their motivation) but we should not be expecting officials to become virtual sponsors and be subsidising the event out of their own pocket.

And so to this year's Rally. Fifty HBRO members present, I don't think we have ever had more than twenty NWLRC members at a National until this year, perhaps this makes us naive trying to do it. I would love to know who Sue & Nick spoke to. In fact, looking at what was said, I know exactly who they spoke to! And I feel they were slightly mislead.

On a minor point the bid was put in three years ago, maybe some people only got involved later and so do not know the full story. Yes, membership this year has dropped but not by a great deal (we have a fixed membership year, comparing the highest figure in December just before they all expire with the figure in May can be misleading). Identifying the reason is a bit harder, certainly despite our intentions Club activities had suffered during the build up to the event. More to the point, we were having problems with the Newsletter due to a change of circumstances with the Editor. He was doing his best but it was appearing later and later until in the end we had to skip an edition totally, this for

a newsletter that only appears every two months normally. When it appeared it often didn't say what it should, and was out of date anyway. This affected both the running of the Club and the International Rally, as members didn't know what was going on. This was nothing to do with the International Rally, although if we hadn't been so involved with that event, the Committee may have taken firmer action earlier to rectify this problem.

As for costing the Club £26000, that is rubbish (and that figure is totally wrong anyway) to start with the Club did not have £26000, so the event cannot have cost the Club that! We set up a separate account for the event about 15 months beforehand, roughly the time we went firm on the site, as we knew we would have to start paying out, primarily the deposit to the land owners. Up until then the amount we had spent on the event probably didn't run into three figures. I suspect less than half that. We transferred a sum from the Club account that was roughly half the figure Alan Smith has mentioned to me as wanting to have in advance of running the event. This did constitute a significant proportion of the Club's balance, but left more than enough to continue running the Club. including staging our Porthmadog Interclub weekend in August. Our Treasurer also found two sources of additional loans, but in the end we didn't require either. As many of you will know Southern allowed us to put entry forms in that year's Rally Packs, a move that was well worth doing. The entries started coming in quickly (the first two were received whilst the Entry Secretary and I were both doing the RTV) and by the time our August event came about we had more in the International Account than when we opened it, despite paying the land deposits, legal fees and getting the entry forms (14000 of them) printed. By the autumn we were in a position to transfer the original sum back into the main Club account, so you will see far from costing us money apart from the initial boost. the event was self-financing, most of the income coming in advance, whilst most of the bills came after the event.

As for causing a lot of friction within the Club, well there were disagreements, and we certainly look at some people in a slightly different light, but we have just had a perfectly amicable AGM and there is only one person maintaining friction.

My biggest regret is that I spent far more time than I hoped in Rally Control and so didn't get as much time to socialise, especially with my fellow Hants & Berks Rover Owners, perhaps if I had, Sue and Nick would have got a more balanced view of the event.

If you wait until everything is in place, all the marshals posts allocated etc, you will never do it (neither would any other club) but if we can do it, so can you. We certainly made mistakes, and things went wrong, but unless everyone is lying through their teeth, we got away with it and most people enjoyed it, I certainly do not regret it.

Go for it!

The trial on the Sunday featured the 45% slopes of the Bowhill Woods, with sections also laid-out on the meadowland. Results are detailed elsewhere in P & B. Many thanks to the setting-out crew, marshals, officials, washing-up girls, and especially to PAM, BBQ Chef par excellence, and the FOOD TEAM. YROC have invited HBRO to a return trip to the wilds of Yorkshire, so maybe something can be arranged next year. Of course I expect many of us will be attending the 1999 ARC annual rally in Yorkshire so at best we have two years to get to grips with the rubber-boot hurling thing!!

Battlehurst Farm inter-club trial with Southern Rover Owners is over. with pretty much a clean sweep for HBRO, which makes a well deserved change from previous events. HBRO won all classes except for class 1, overall; I and the team shield. Results elsewhere in P & B. Well done everyone, SROC were close on our tails, and it made for an exciting event. Now we have to start planning for 1998, when SROC will be hosting the event. Unfortunately the Gymkhana didn't quite get going, with one section only completed, but it was a useful warm-up for the Nelly's summer special, to be run by Nick Jennings. The bike trial was entertaining, and painful (this is more dangerous than trialling !!??) and won by Gary Hodgson. The Farm drive, was a marathon and I believe thoroughly enjoyed by all, with even a section of 'challenging terrain' thrown in for good measure. Brian Bashall's owls are magnificent, for those who made it passed his collection of Land Rover products. Many thanks to Brian, and the Farmer for the Farm drive/tour, to Barry/Andrew Simpson and team for 2 weekends preparation and setting-out of the event, and to the marshals, officials, helpers, etc., for making it all happen.

Southern Hill rally or the 'I can't see a thing' Rally has been and gone. HBRO basically got the Alton Down stage to marshal, and on the first day ran the finish timing. Unfortunately due to the dry weather any vehicle driving on the plain created a plume of dust which covered everything and everybody. This was particularly noticeable when Hill Rally Competitors for some reason insisted on rushing everywhere as if they were in a bit of a hurry !! There were lots going-on through the day and evening at the main arena, however us dedicated marshals obeying the safety rules dutifully manned the 5 stages throughout the weekend for up to 4 hours per stage. Nonetheless it was good fun, even though only a privileged few got to see the Simmonites roll early on the Alton Down

stage.

<u>Festival of Motorsport</u> has now become a bi-annual event, and will not take place this year. So you now have a free weekend on the 13/14 September 1997.

<u>Hook End</u> is the September (20/21), venue for RTV and CCVT (if anyone is interested, please call me), trials, courtesy Mark Ambler. Camping is available form Friday through Sunday. No barbecue this time. Dogs on leads please, this is a sheep farm.

<u>Bagshot Show</u> is on the weekend of the 27/28 September, and HBRO will be the host club for the weekend. See Alan Smith for details.

ARC National Rally Meeting will take place on the 12 September, with the participation of Dave Cuthbert, who will give us the inside story on this years event in North Wales, and the committee will expand on its thoughts for running the event in the year 2000. PLEASE TRY TO ATTEND THIS MEETING - IT IS VITAL TO AIR THIS SUBJECT WELL IF WE ARE TO DECIDE WHETHER TO RUN THE RALLY IN THE YEAR 2000.

Off-Road driving day & Trials at Slab is set for weekend of the 11/12 October. The DLS has issued the licence for the site, so all is well. The Sunday will be both a 'Trials day' and a Scenic/Leisure drive day. The scenic drive day will be open to other clubs, and the public. If you have anything which you feel would contribute to the discussion, please give me a call and tell me about it.



1. Admin

1.1 Caravanning / Camping

Jim Campbell, National Caravan Secretary for the ARC, has recently renewed our exemption certificate, allowing him to continue to issue permits for our member clubs' caravan rallies.

The DOE have reviewed their rules and procedures, and some of their changes have a marked effect on our rules in turn.

These are:

- a) Only members of member clubs (and their immediate families) may attend a rally run under an ARC permit. You cannot invite family or friends in another tent or caravan to an ARC permitted rally under any circumstance. If you choose to have friends/family stay with you in your van, or awning, or tent, that is permissible, but in another unit (tent or caravan) it is not.
- b) The previously used 'escape clause' of making people 'temporary members' for the weekend (or period) is not permissible. 'Members' means fully signed up members for the full financial year.
- c) The principle of allowing attendance at one rally to allow potential members to see whether they like us (!) is not permissible.

We are sorry if this inconveniences any of you, but we have to enforce the rules or lose our privileges. The breaking of these rules could lose us the ability to hold caravan/camping rallies, and would result in the landowner being taken to court by the Local Authority for infringement of Planning Law.

Therefore, please do not put our permit at risk by hoping you can talk your way in - your friends/relatives will be turned away.

Many clubs have rules which allow non-Rover-owning 'enthusiasts' to become members, this is the only non-risk route to take and it's not expensive.

Rally organisers within the clubs should also make it clear to landowners that <u>we</u> do have the ability to raise these permits, and should warn landowners about approaches from other organisations who do not. These organisations could cause the landowner to be taken to court, and then you lose the use of that land - protect your privilege.

And finally, will organisers please send the application forms to Jim Campbell early enough to allow for work, holidays, postal delays, power cuts, etc, and if dealing by post, you must enclose a stamped addressed envelope for return of the permit to the relevant person.

1.2 ARC News Circulation - Membership Lists

Andrew Neaves has asked me to appeal to club membership secretaries to keep him up to date with membership lists on a regular basis in order to avoid 'hiccups'. If individual members change address, you must notify your club quickly and your club must keep Andrew updated. There is no point in advising Andrew or myself of your change, because if your club's next disc isn't changed, your old address gets re-inserted. Likewise if you are a member of several clubs, and most make the change but one doesn't, your old address gets left in the list.

1.3 EGM's - Agenda

It has been said in the past that EGM's spend 90% of the time discussing competition rules etc, and never discuss the subjects you want discussed. It is worth noting that competition matters at recent EGM's have taken perhaps 5% of the meeting time, but it does allow us to remind you that if you want a subject discussed, ask John Bradbury - in writing - to put your item on the agenda. Individual members do, of course, need to do this via their club committee, preferably in writing to the club secretary.

1.4 Finance Matters

Following questions at a recent EGM, Andrew Stavordale explains below two items of ARC financial matters:-

The ARC Fighting Fund was set up around 1990 to provide a source of money to aid in the funding of legal action against any body that seeks to remove the right of way from or access to public areas/roads. This includes councils attempting to place a TRO on a RUPP to major events like a widespread closure of a recognised right of way e.g. The Ridgeway.

Legal action is expensive and the fighting fund is not a bottomless pit and has been used over the years to aid in various actions, more often in paying for expert witnesses or testimony in a particular case.

The fund is kept going by donations from ARC clubs and concerned individuals and since this year the fund will receive 25% of the ARC levy received from the International Rally. Since January 1996 the fund has only paid out in one case, that of the Presili Hills Enquiry when an expert was assigned to help prepare the case against the action. More details of this particular case can be obtained from Tony Kempster, ARC Rights of Way and Land Access Officer. The fund currently stands at about £600 and donations are being sought to help increase its balance - if you or your club wish then please give generously. The fund is managed by five trustees: ARC Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Tony Kempster and Tony Holder.

ARC Expenses

Like any business, the ARC incurs expenses in providing the day to day service to its members. Much of these expenses are incurred by ARC directly, such as LARA subscriptions, photocopier maintenance etc. Other expenses are incurred by persons working on behalf of ARC such as the secretary, who spend money on postage, stationery, travel etc. As a national organisation, it is not practical to have a 'post room' or 'stationery cupboard' in a central location so these people claim these expenses back from the treasurer. An official form is used for the claim and details and receipts must be provided to substantiate the claim. Travel expenses are paid where the claimant has made a journey which, were it not for ARC, he would not have made. These are paid on a pence per mile basis dependant on the vehicle's economy. Expenses can be claimed by anyone working on behalf of ARC but should be approved in advance where an exceptional expense may occur.

1.5 Competition Scene

With their 'plan-ahead' hats on, the Scrutineering Committee offer the following advice:-

"If you are planning to buy safety equipment in the near future, the RACMSA say that whilst it is not yet mandatory for national motor sport it is recommended that replacement items are to the following standards:-

Competition Scats - Approval to FIA 8855

Safety Harnesses - Approval to FIA 8853 and 8854

Fire extinguishers hand held - Approval to BS5423 or EN3 with Fire Industry rating of at least 34B. Note that Halon/BCF extinguishers cease to be an approved type from Jan 1st 2000. Recommended contents for new extinguishers will now be ZERO2000 or AFFF (Aqueous Film-Forming Foam).*

2. LARA News from Tony Kempster

2.1 The July LARA meeting confirmed Tim Stevens as LARA's new Motor Recreation Development Officer (MRDO) and the Information Officer. A new post of Planning Officer has been filled by Alan Kind who has been very much involved with LARA for many years following its inception in 1986. LARA is obtaining a legal opinion as to whether to lodge an appeal against an inspector's decision earlier this year that vehicular user evidence of a RUPP in Somerset is inadmissible. His decision follows a Planning Inspectorate guidance note issued in April this year which advises inspectors that all post-1930 vehicular use of RUPPs is a criminal offence and cannot be taken as user evidence to establish BOAT status. If an appeal is made, the Planning Inspectorate of the DOE can choose either to admit they are wrong or fight it in court. This is a very important issue - if the guidance note is not successfully challenged by way of an appeal against the inspector's decision, it will have serious consequences for all recreational vehicle users. It means that all RUPP reclassifications would result in their becoming bridleways unless there were sufficient documentary evidence for BOAT status which is often not the case. It is also likely that some RUPPs previously reclassified as BOATs could become bridleways. There is additionally potential for prosecutions for illegal driving on RUPPs since 1930.

This important issue was put to the June ARC meeting and it was agreed that the ARC would support an appeal and the Trustees of the Fighting Fund subsequently agreed to contribute towards the cost. If you feel strongly about the continued use of green roads, ask your club committee to consider underwriting part of the appeal cost - or even doing so yourself. All ARC club secretaries are being sent further information.

Bullet point notes on the Somerset RUPP case are listed below

- Norton Malreward is a small village in Somerset. Nearby is a not-very-remarkable green road which was nut down on the definitive map as a Road Used as a Public Path (RUPP).
- Somerset County Council duly started its review of RUPPs and made a reclassification order to reclassify NM-RUPP as a bridleway.
- · Local TRF (maybe other users too) objected to the order.
- At the public inquiry in 1994 the inspector took the objections on board and decided that the RUPP should be a BOAT.
- The evidence was a mixture of old documents and user but is was not strong evidence. Had the inspector
 decided that the status should be bridleway it would not have been a great surprise, nor something that
 could have been challenged at appeal.
- The order was re-advertised as BOAT. Further objections were received (including one from Mrs Masters
 of GLEAM).
- A second public inquiry was held, in spring 1997, with a new inspector the first one had died. Mrs
 Masters and others objected and put in some new documentary evidence which, they said, showed that the
 road was not a BOAT.
- In his decision letter the inspector acknowledged the new objections. He then said that the user evidence
 accepted in the first inquiry was no longer valid. That, he concluded, meant that there was insufficient
 evidence to show BOAT status, so he put it back to bridleway.
- The reason why he could not accept the user evidence was because in April 1997 the Planning Inspectorate
 issued a new "guidance note" which advised inspectors that all post-1930 vehicular use of RUPPs is a
 criminal offence and cannot be taken as user evidence.
- The rights of way "brains" in LARA and the BBT believe that this "guidance note" is fundamentally wrong
 in law. If it is, the inspector has misdirected himself in law during his deliberations.
- The only effective course of action clearly visible is to lodge an appeal against the confirmation of the order
 on the grounds that the inspector misdirected himself as to the law.
- If this appeal is lodged (and the last date to lodge is 8 August) then our case will be set out in a formal statement of case. The Planning Inspectorate can choose to admit they are wrong or fight it in court.
- If we win (either way) the judge will strike down the second public inquiry decision and order it to be re-made with proper regard for the legal position. The inspector might still say "only a bridleway" to the NM-RUPP. That does not really matter.
- Our real target is the erroneous guidance note. It has now been used to our disadvantage in at least five RUPP reclassification cases. If it is not successfully challenged then the whole position of driving on RUPPs is seriously undermined.
- Also damaged is the chance of reclassifying RUPPs to BOAT in the future, and some RUPPs previously
 reclassified to BOAT might be struck down to bridleway.
- The appeal also gives us the opportunity to air to the judge the views of Lord Denning and Lord Diplock that RUPPs are more than footpaths and bridleways - a line of attack steadfastly denied by the Planning Inspectorate over the years.
- The real attraction of NM-RUPP as a case to appeal is the very fact that the actual evidence of status is thin.
 That concentrates the question right on the issue of the guidance note.

footnote, 9.7.97: Tony Kempster is in touch with barrister Edwin Simpson to review the case, and to discuss if it is strong enough to take further. This first consultation will cost probably £400-500. If we proceed further, it will be work in hand and not money wasted.

RTV Trial and Scenic Drive at Slab Common October 12th



The New Pub Meet








Major's Trial & Comp Safari - 4th-5th October

Bagshot Heath Off-Road Show 1997


